

History of Leon Brethren Church

The Brethren Church was started near Schwarzenau, Germany, in 1708, when eight determined believers met together and decided to fully follow and practice the teachings of the New Testament. By 1719 religious persecution became so severe that many in the original group sailed to America and established the first church in Germantown, PA. From this point the church scattered across America.

The first Brethren Church was constructed in 1874, six miles northeast of Leon and was known as Franklin. In 1883 there was a division of the church over the question of uniformity in religious garb. The liberal members joined with the Presbyterians in building a Union Chapel at Crown.

In 1913, the Crown Chapel Church made plans to hold revival meetings in Leon. These meetings led the people to see the need of a church in Leon. Cars were making transportation easier and several of the young people were in the Leon High School. Following the revival a Sunday School was held over a store building in Leon. The present Leon Brethren Church is an outgrowth of this Sunday School started by George Ronk. After much prayer and consideration it was agreed to purchase the lot of W.A. Alexander, known as Hoffines Corner. The price for the lot was \$1000.00. This was Oct. 11, 1913. Plans were drawn for the church building by Pastor Ronk and work was soon underway. Most of the charter members came from Union and Crown Chapel Churches. Much of the work was done by the members.

Although the building was not finished, it was dedicated Oct. 25, 1914.

The church continued to grow under the ministry of Pastor Ronk. In July of 1916, F.G. Coleman was ordained as an elder to assist Pastor Ronk and the two country churches. Brother Coleman assisted until 1917 when he resigned and S.R. and J.F. Garber were chosen to assist until a full time pastor could be secured.

In August of 1919, G.T. Ronk was again called to be the pastor.

At a business meeting, July 25, 1920, a decision was made to consolidate the 3 congregations of Leon, Union, and Crown Chapel under one church head. These three groups were united September 20, 1920 and G.T. Ronk was elected as pastor at a salary of \$100.00 a month. After another year of serving the Lord faithfully brother Ronk left and Sam and John Garber again filled in as pastors until a full time pastor could be secured.

After a series of revival meetings in the Leon Church Rev. Claude Studebaker was called to be the pastor. He accepted and moved to Leon with his family in Sept. of 1924. Pastor Studebaker ably cared for the flock until May, 1929, when he accepted a call to go to Pittsburgh, PA.

After much prayer and consideration a call was extended to Miles Taber. The Lord led him to accept the pastorate and he and his wife arrived in Leon, June 9, 1929, and the Tabers were blessed almost immediately with a baby girl.

At a called meeting, Oct. 25, 1929, a constitution was adopted, the first the Leon Church ever had.

The Tabers left Leon for a pastorate in Fillmore, CA, in July, 1934.

Conard Sandy was called to the ministry here and took up pastoral duties Aug. 23, 1934. Sandys were here just one year and Rev. Henderson accepted a call to Leon. This ministry continued until he resigned in 1937.

Again, Miles Taber was contacted and it was a joyous occasion when they accepted and returned to Leon in April, 1938. The church grew under his ministry and there is evidence of real spiritual growth. The church celebrated its 25th anniversary Oct. 25, 1939, with a special program commemorating the event.

During the years from 1936 on there was dissention at the school in Ashland, Ohio. The trouble was caused by several professors in the college and seminary who were not Brethren and consequently there were opposing viewpoints among the teachers concerning the practical application of the scriptures and worldliness among teachers and students. The outcome of this was the establishment of a new seminary at Winona Lake, IN. It was decided that the Leon church would cast their lot with the new group forming at Winona Lake.

In July of 1943 the property belonging to Grace Hutchison was purchased for a parsonage. Pastor Taber was working at the Leon Post Office and he gave half of his salary each month in payment on the parsonage.

July 30, 1945, Miles Taber received a call to Winona Lake to be editor of the Brethren Missionary Herald. He resigned his pastorate and helped the church secure Rev. Paul Davis as pastor. The Davises ministered until Nov.,

1946. A call was extended to R.H. Kettell who had previously held meetings for us. He accepted and was soon on the field laboring for the Lord. The church grew under the faithful ministry of Pastor Kettell.

Marion Gates was called to be our pastor in 1952 and served until 1954.


Ronald Robinson was called to be pastor in 1955. About this time a lawsuit was instigated against us by George Ronk and a few followers in an attempt to get the church property into the hands of the liberal Ashland, Ohio group. The Lord used Ronald Robinson and many friends from Winona Lake and throughout the brotherhood in the legal battle that followed. The Lord graciously allowed us to keep our church building as our place of worship.

Ronald Robinson resigned in January, 1959, and we were without a pastor until September. Glen Welborn accepted the call to carry on the Lord's work in the Leon church. During his pastorate the front of the church was remodeled and two gas furnaces were installed and many other needed improvements with Pastor Welborn furnishing much of the labor and advice. A new parsonage was constructed at 604 N. Main. The Welborns moved to that address in 1964. The Welborns' ministry continued until June, 1987. This completed almost 28 years of caring faithfully for the flock, the longest of any pastorate of the church.

Pastor Russell Betz began his ministry with us in mid-June, 1987, and is preaching the word and caring for the flock at the present time.

We have two long time missionaries, members of our church, in full time service for the Lord. They are Miss Angie Garber, working among the Navajo Indians in New Mexico and Rosella Cochran, missionary in Africa. Glen Welborn, our former pastor, is also serving as interim pastor in Kenai, Alaska.


A glance back over the years reveals many human shortcomings and failures, but our Lord has been faithful. To Him we give all the praise, honor, and glory.






Miles Taber upon his arrival in Leon 1929



A Brief Description of the Building

The church is of a distinctly new type, being a modification for religious purposes of what is known as the bungalow style. There are but few churches built along this line in the country and none known to the writer of so distinctly the bungalow type; the chief variation being in the steeper pitch of roof made as a compromise with convention and also necessary to maintain the symmetrical lines and give that airy appearance which is the chief distinction of this building.

Though the structure is quite large it appears small and dainty. One would not suspect from its appearance that it is 78x50 feet at its greatest dimensions and almost 40 feet high to the ridge roll, with a capacity of about 400.

The building is frame, covered with stucco and shingles, built on a very heavy foundation of concrete and paving brick with hollow tile. The basement wall varies from thirteen to twenty-two inches in thickness.

The stucco forms a belt seven feet wide around the building, reaching to the water table at the window line. The shingles on the sides and roof are stained a beautiful golden leather brown. Ridge roll, cornice and all trimmings are in pure white.

The windows are specially designed with a series of three casements and a transom sash above, all opening out. The glass is a uniform grade of green opal on a white and amber base.

The front is of the over-hung gable, inset porch effect with pergola beamed ceiling. The front doors are oak slabs in six-paned bungalow style. Four pillars support the gable.

Inside the building a stairway leads from the small entry to the basement. The main auditorium has a drop floor and heavy oak beamed ceiling with walls balanced by picture rail and chair rail. The ceiling is painted cream, the walls light tan and the base from the chair rail down a dark tan. Beautiful electric fixtures in classic design at the beam intersections hold large moonstone reflectors. All light is diffused. The shape of the building in the form of a cross is carried out in the panels of the large doors which divide off the three Sunday school rooms from the auditorium, yet allow the whole building to be converted for auditorium purposes. The aisle and platform carpet is tan and brown set off with green.

The pews are straight with shaped backs and seats and massive modern ends. The large oak settee in genuine Spanish leather is the gift of the "Boosters" young men's class at Crown Chapel.

The basement is still unfinished, but will be completed the following season. There will be wood floor over water-proof cement. The walls will be plastered and tinted and eight Sunday school rooms provided, besides two dressing rooms, furnace room, fuel room.

The building is heated with low pressure steam plant. Ventilation is provided for by transom sashes and ceiling ventilator. It is comfortable and attractive throughout and well meets the three great requirements of beauty, utility and economy of construction and maintenance.



First Sunday School was probably held here in this building in downtown Leon (now Coast to Coast Store). The third floor was removed several years ago.

A note from Himena Frost - January 28, 1989

I remember when Rev. and Mrs. Ronk first came to Leon to establish a "Progressive Brethren Church." My father, a carpenter by trade, helped from the beginning of the building. My father was well up in years and we lived quite a distance from the church. Mother would make him a hot lunch and I would carry it to him. I was 13 or 14 at the time and in this way father could rest during the lunch period.



Vanderflught is the present owner of the farm where the building is located. A house mover, Bill Rumley, moved it. It took 3 to 4 Cats with steering wheels to move it. The building was pulled over a strawberry bed and they picked strawberries from inside the church, Mr. Bruce recalls.








Young People's Group - Summer 1943. It was necessary to meet in the Leon High School Gym as there was not sufficient room at the church. Sunday School attendance was over 200.







My first memories of our new church were smelling the new lumber as I was carried up the basement stairs. George Ronk was the pastor and we would sit on his lap on the cement runners bordering the outside steps.

He would get up at four o'clock and fire up the furnace. The radiators would hiss as they heated. I enjoyed looking out the open windows in the spring when everything was fragrant with lilacs and spring flowers.

Easter was a joyous time when we would have sunrise prayer meeting in the basement kneeling at the chairs circling the walls. The boys would see how many eggs they could eat at the breakfast which always followed the prayer service.

It was a special treat to sit on the little red chairs in our Sunday School class. The first teacher I remember was Nancy Kemp. Grandpa Bunch used to sit on the back seat and we would sit by him until he gave us pink wintergreen candies, then we would go up with our parents.

It was always a joy to go to church whether we went in our old Model T, in the big wagon, single buggy, one horse sleigh or on foot. We had lots of friends and relatives there to join in our worship and praise to our Lord.

I especially loved the three weeks of revival meetings held each winter. It was a thrill to see people leave their seats and go up to the front to accept the Lord. Many were faithful until they died. What a blessing to grow up in such a church where we learned early of the One who is still our greatest joy.



THE MESSAGE OF THE BRETHREN MINISTRY

- 1. Our Motto: The BIBLE, the whole Bible and nothing but the BIBLE.
- 2. The Authority and Integrity of the Holy Scriptures. The ministry of The Brethren Church desires to bear testimony to the belief that God's supreme revelation has been made through Jesus Christ, a complete and authentic record of which revelation is the New Testament; and, to the belief that the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments, as originally given, are the infallible record of the perfect, final and authoritative revelation of God's will, altogether sufficient in themselves as a rule of faith and practice.
- 3. We understand the basic content of our doctrinal preaching and teaching to be:
 - The pre-existence and incarnation by Virgin Birth of Jesus Christ, the Son of God;
 - (2) The Fall of Man, his consequent spiritual death and utter sinfulness and the necessity of his New Birth;
 - (3) The Vicarious Atonement of the Lord Jesus Christ through the shedding of His own Blood;
 - (4) The Resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ in the body in which He suffered and died and His subsequent Glorification at the Right Hand of God;
 - (5) Justification by personal faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, of which obedience to the will of God and works of righteousness are the evidence and result; the resurrection of the dead, the judgment of the world, and the life everlasting of the just.
 - (6) The Personality and Deity of the Holy Spirit who indwells the Christian and is his Comforter and Guide.
 - (7) The Personal and Visible Return of our Lord Jesus Christ from Heaven as King of Kings and Lord of Lords the glorious goal for which we are taught to watch, wait, and pray;
 - (8) The Christian should "be not conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of the mind"; should not engage in carnal strife and should "swear not at all";
 - (9) The Christian should observe, as his duty and privilege, the ordinances of our Lord Jesus Christ, among which are (a) baptism of believers by Trine Immersion; (b) confirmation; (c) the Lord's Supper; (d) the Communion of the Bread and Wine; (e) the washing of the saint's feet; and (f) the anointing of the sick with oil.

This is historic, Biblical Christianity.
